### Principal's Message

The focus of Lyndon B. Johnson Elementary School is to educate all children and help them achieve their full potential. We shape a mindset for success in developing important lifetime academic and social skills. LBJ emphasizes Creative and Deep Thinking skill sets. On a daily basis LBJ demonstrates POWER (Perseverance, Open Minded, Well Rounded, Excellence and Respect) as well as following the Pyramid of Success as part of the school's value system. Through on going professional development, using best practices and collaboration, teachers provide students with the best and most effective strategies for teaching reading, writing, math, science and social studies. All work is carefully monitored and measured for individual student growth. Emphasis is placed on higher levels of analysis and applying concepts to solving new and innovative solutions. LBJ has a full time PE teacher, instructional coach, counselor, and an after school program. The English Language Learner and accelerated growth of students provides for 40 minutes of daily intervention and tutoring to address targeted improvement of individual student skills. Grade level teams collaborate daily to plan and implement rigorous standards based curriculum. Parents, Community, Teachers, Staff, Students comprise the stakeholders who work together for the academic and social growth of our students and in meeting student academic needs. Working together, LBJ offers a welcoming, safe, caring environment to help students with a foundation of academic excellence, experience, and development of skill sets to be successful throughout their life.

## School Description

Lyndon B. Johnson Elementary School is located in the central region of Indio and serves students in grades transitional kindergarten through five following a traditional calendar. At the beginning of the 2019-20 school year, 560 students were enrolled, including 11.6% in special education, 28.6% qualifying for English Language Learner support, and 87.3% qualifying for free or reduced price lunch.

## Student Achievement

### Physical Fitness

In the spring of each year, Lyndon B. Johnson Elementary School is required by the state to administer a physical fitness test to all students in grade five. The physical fitness test measures each student's ability to complete fitness tasks in six major areas. Students who either meet or exceed the standards in all six fitness areas are considered to be in the "healthy fitness zone." The chart reported in this document reports only the percentage in each category, not a cumulative total of the results for categories 4 of 6 and 5 of 6. ### California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress

The California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP) System includes the Smarter Balanced Summative Assessments (SBAC) for students in the general education population, and the California Alternate Assessments (CAAs) for students with the most significant cognitive disabilities. Only eligible students may participate in the administration of the CAAs. CAAs items are aligned with alternative achievement standards, which are

linked with the Common Core State Standards (CCSS). CAASPP results are a measure of how well students are mastering California's standards in English language arts/literacy (ELA) and mathematics, and are given to grades three through eight and grade eleven. SBAC tests assess student performance in ELA/Literacy and mathematics utilizing computer-adaptive tests and performance tasks, and CAAs test items are aligned with alternative achievement standards which are linked with the Common Core State Standards (CCSS).

The CAASPP results shown in this report include overall results comparing the school, district and state scores as well as the school's overall score in each applicable subgroup. Results are shown only for subgroups with ten students or more taking the exam. For those categories that are blank in the tables, no students met subgroup criteria. ## School Facilities & Maintenance

The district takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional through proper facilities maintenance and campus supervision. Lyndon B. Johnson Elementary School's original facilities were built in 2000; ongoing maintenance and campus improvements ensure facilities remain up to date and provide adequate space for students and staff. District maintenance and site custodial staff ensure that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good condition are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used by school and district staff to communicate non-routine maintenance requests. Emergency repairs are given the highest priority. In the last 12 months, the following campus repairs or improvements were completed:

Every morning before school begins, the custodian inspects facilities for safety hazards or other conditions that need attention prior to students and staff entering school grounds. One day custodian and one evening custodian are assigned to Lyndon B. Johnson Elementary School. The day custodian is responsible for:

- Classroom cleaning
- Cafeteria setup/cleanup
- Office area cleaning
- Restroom cleaning

Restrooms are checked throughout the day for cleanliness and subsequently cleaned as needed. The evening custodian is responsible for:

- Classroom cleaning
- Restroom cleaning

The principal communicates with custodial staff daily concerning maintenance and school safety issues.

**Campus Supervision**

School administration and teaching staff place a high priority on providing adequate adult supervision on campus before, during, and after school. As students arrive on campus each morning, the principal and the counselor are in front of the school greeting parents and students while school site monitors are assigned to designated areas on the playground. During recess, teachers and school site monitors supervise playground activity. Administrators, school site monitors, and the counselor monitor lunch time activity in the cafeteria and on the playground. At the end of the day when students are dismissed, the principal and the counselor monitor student behavior to ensure a safe and orderly departure.

Lyndon B. Johnson Elementary School is a closed campus. During school hours, all visitors must sign in at the school's office with a valid state issued identification to be scanned through the Raptor Security System and wear an identification sticker while on school grounds. They must then check out at the school office upon exit from the school site.

**School Site Safety Plan**

The Comprehensive School Site Safety Plan was developed for Lyndon B. Johnson Elementary School in collaboration with local agencies and the district office to fulfill Senate Bill 187 requirements. Components of this plan include child abuse reporting procedures, teacher notification of dangerous pupil procedures, disaster response procedures, procedures for safe arrival and departure from school, sexual harassment policy, and dress code policy. The school's most recent school safety plan will be reviewed, updated, and discussed with school staff by March 1, 2021.

**Classroom Environment**

**Discipline & Climate for Learning**

Lyndon B. Johnson Elementary School's discipline practices and behavior management strategies comply with approved board policies and are designed to create effective learning environments and minimize classroom disruptions. Progressive discipline and proactive measures are employed in the classroom for those students experiencing difficulty following school rules and demonstrating positive behavior. Disciplinary intervention is managed by school administrators in a fair, firm, and consistent manner based upon the nature of each situation.

## Curriculum & Instruction

### Staff Development

All training and curriculum development activities at Lyndon B. Johnson Elementary School revolve around the California State Content Standards and Frameworks. During the 2019-20 school year, Lyndon B. Johnson Elementary School held staff development training devoted to:

- Trauma Informed Practices
- Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS)
- Schoolwide Writing Program
- Rigor, Relevance, Engagement & Relationships (ICLE)
- Character Education - Pyramid of Success

Decisions concerning selection of staff development activities are performed by all staff using tools such as teacher input and data analysis to determine the areas in which additional teacher training may enhance classroom instruction and increase student achievement levels. Lyndon B. Johnson Elementary School supports ongoing professional growth throughout the year during staff meetings. Teachers meet in grade level teams to conduct data analysis to identify areas of need. Teaching staff are provided the opportunity to participate in district-sponsored staff development workshops or training session as 1) a supplement to site-based staff development, 2) for reinforcement of or follow-up on previous training, or 3) follow-up training for newly implemented programs/curricula.

Lyndon B. Johnson Elementary School offers support to new and veteran teachers through peer coaching and mentoring. All staff are encouraged to attend professional workshops and conferences. Classified support staff receive job-related training from department supervisors and district representatives.

### Instructional Materials

All textbooks used in the core curriculum at Lyndon B. Johnson Elementary School are aligned to the California Content Standards and Frameworks. Instructional materials are selected from the state's most recent list of standards-based materials and adopted by the State Board of Education. The district follows the State Board of Education's eight-year adoption cycle for core content materials (English/language arts, math, science, and social science).

On Tuesday, October 06, 2020, the Desert Sands Unified School District's Board of Education held a public hearing to certify the extent to which textbooks and instructional materials have been provided to students. The Board of Education adopted Resolution No. 11/2020-2021 which certifies as required by Education Code §60119 (1) that textbooks and instructional materials were provided to all students, including English learners, in the district to the extent that each pupil has a textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home, and (2) sufficient textbooks and instructional materials were provided to each student, including English learners, that are aligned to the academic content standards and consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks in math, science, history-social science, and English/language arts.

In addition to core subject areas, districts are required to disclose in their SARC's the sufficiency of instructional materials used for their visual/performing arts curricula. During the 2020-21 school year, Desert Sands Unified School District provided each student, including English learners, enrolled in a visual/performing arts class with a textbook or instructional materials to use in class and to take home. These materials complied with the state's content standards and curriculum frameworks.

## Professional Staff

### Counseling & Support Staff

Lyndon B. Johnson Elementary School provides professional, highly qualified staff that provide additional services and support centered on the whole student academically, physically, and mentally. The Counseling and Support Services table in this report illustrates the availability of non-instructional support staff to Lyndon B. Johnson Elementary School's students. Full-time equivalent (FTE) is a standard measurement used to identify an employee's regular work load on a weekly basis. For example, an FTE of 1.0 designates a full-time position and the employee is on campus and available all day every day of the week; an FTE of 0.5 indicates that the staff member is available and on campus a portion (50%) of the week.

### Expenditures Per Student
